

South Lodge Pit - Taplow Quarry Cleanup May 31st 2008

The South Lodge Pit exposes one of the few examples of the Late Cretaceous, (Santonian age \sim 84 myrs) Phosophatic Chalks in England. The beds contain a concentration of up to 15% P_2O_5 and preserve a rich variety of fossils.

Around a dozen people enjoyed a fine day at the Taplow site performing the first major clean up since the site was last re-excavated in 1999.

Graham Hickman started by explaining the origins of the Phosphatic Chalk and why the site has a geological SSSI status (Site of Special Scientific Importance). The group, a combination of BEHG, Taplow & Hitcham Society members, and regular volunteers from Taplow Court, then proceeded to cut back the Buddleia.

Taplow Court staff provided a large mechanical chipper, which was used to dispose of the cut branches.

The site will need to be revisited next year to manage the re-growth of the Buddleia and the hard to reach places. However a general interest visit is being arranged for more members to view the geological features here.

Stone SSSi - Quarry Clean-up - June 12th 2008

Unfortunately this event had to be cancelled. Jill Eyres made a reconnaissance trip and discovered that the site was far too overgrown and a task too large for our group to attempt.

Pury End Quarry Trip – July 12th 2008



Michael Oates led an excellent trip exploring the Middle Jurassic sequences found at the Pury End Quarry (SP 707458) just north of the Buckinghamshire border.



On top of these is a cover of a different type of clay, completely without any structure and full of fragments of other rocks. This is the Boulder Clay, and is proof that this area was covered during the Ice Age (a paltry 120 thousand years ago!) by glacier ice. The Boulder Clay was scraped up from the land surface as the ice moved southward left behind, dumped when the ice melted. Many different types of exotic rock were found within the Boulder Clay. Some of these even show scratch marks, from being ground together in the slowly-moving ice.

A full section of Blisworth Clay, Bliswoth Limestone and Rutland Formation are exposed. They were formed on a shallow warm sea-floor around 175 million years ago. Of course, England as we know it did not exist then. A low-lying island, possibly occasionally completely submerged, would have been present to the south, lying where London now is, and extending to the east, forming what is now the Ardennes Hills in Belgium. Very shallow sea fringed this island, much like the Florida Keys in the USA today. We find the same types of animals living in Florida as the fossilised shells that lived all those years ago in Northamptonshire. Sea Urchins, burrowing and surface-living bivalves and long narrow gastropods (snails), which live among sea-grasses. Fossil fish teeth provide evidence that some mollusceating shark-like creatures enjoyed feasting on these shellfish.



Fossil & Archaeology Fun Day at the County Museum – July 19th 2008

The BEHG put on a good display in the garden marquee at the Museum's summer fun day. Attractions included Mike Henty's Magic Minerals, Simon Penn's remarkable display of fossils he has found over the last couple of years and Linda McArdell's gold panning activity. Mike Palmer, with the help of Alice Kennedy, also made produced some displays of geological specimens from the Museum's collections. Visitor numbers were certainly up on last year's event and it was particularly pleasing to see people bringing in their mystery rocks and fossils for identification. Thanks must go also to Linda Jane, Lindsey Hiles and Carol Alice Kennedy for helping out.

The BEHG *Rock & Fossil Roadshow* moves on to the County Show on Thursday 29th August. This is always a popular and well attended show and the Group's hands-on geology displays should prove a real hit.
