Sunday 24^h June 2023, (date and times tbc). Norfolk Trip: Grimes Graves

A very exciting trip for us to be back to Norfolk after some time! Grime's Graves is the only Neolithic flint mine open to visitors in Britain. This grassy lunar landscape of 400 pits was first named Grim's Graves by the Anglo-Saxons. It was not until one of them was excavated in 1870 that they were identified as flint mines dug over 5,000 years ago. A small exhibition area illustrates the history of this fascinating site and artefacts. The visit will include a descent by a 9 metre (30 ft) ladder into one excavated shaft to see the Chalk mines with the jet-black flint horizons that were the prize. Set amid the distinctive Breckland heath landscape. Grime's Graves is also a Site of Special Scientific Interest and a habitat for rare plants and fauna. The visit will end around middle afternoon and there are several nearby locations that will be recommended for visiting under your own steam. There are plenty of B&Bs or hotels to stay over if you want to make this a full weekend. At the moment I am unable to make the group reservation until the New Year. But if you are interested, please put your name on the list. You will need to say if you are a member of English Heritage (this will be free entry, provide your membership number). If you are not a member then the cost should be around £7 or £8, but parking may be payable as extra (tbc). Jill is organising this trip and leading the tour with an EH tour guide giving information and leading us into the mine. BOOKING ESSENTIAL.
